

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
Diébédo Francis Kéré, Pritzker Prize 2022


Diébédo Francis Kéré (Gando, Burkina Faso, 56 years old) has won this year's prestigious Pritzker Architecture Prize, becoming the first African architect to do so, thanks to his social and sustainable buildings. In 1998 he created what

is now the Kéré Foundation to provide his native country with infrastructure that would foster opportunities for future generations. From his studio in Berlin, he has designed a work based on his commitment to building and sharing knowledge.

The opening of the new CaixaForum Valencia expands the range of art and culture on offer in the Valencian capital. The building was designed by the Cloud 9 studio, headed by the architect Enric Ruiz-Geli. It has two large exhibition halls located in the middle of the ground floor, which act as the project's central meeting space or true agora. In addition, there is an auditorium, whose ceiling is the work of the artist Frederic Amat, a bookshop, and an educational space. All this is immersed in the spectacular Ágora de la Ciutat de les Arts i les Ciències, a creation by Santiago Calatrava.

New Wave Architecture creates offices in Tehran that 'emerge' from the ground

The groundbreaking Turbosealtech office building, in Tehran's Pardis Science and Technology Park, is the work of the New Wave Architecture studio. The building has an original, sloping and thermoregulated exterior volume that is drawn up from the ground, with a panoramic image that harmonises with the environment. The glass envelope of the façade allows natural light to flood in, and the interiors enhance interaction between users.








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
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The shapes of cognac

Hennessy has collaborated with architect Daniel Libeskind to create a new design that pays tribute to the founder of this legendary brand of cognac: Richard Hennessy. The new bottle, with its futuristic lines, is made of Baccarat crystal, in an interesting reference to the architecture that inspired Libeskind. The architect, who designed the One World Trade Center in New York among other works, has created an innovative silhouette with curved and organic shapes that bring energy and complexity to this exceptional cognac. The new bottle took nearly four years to design and develop, and symbolises the future of the brand, while honouring its past.








London's Victoria and Albert Museum presents "Fashioning Masculinities: The Art of Menswear", the first retrospective exhibition to explore and celebrate the artistry and power of men's fashion. It includes over one hundred *looks* and one hundred works of art that define how men's clothes have evolved and changed over the centuries and how designers have visualised constructions of masculinity. The exhibition, curated by JA Projects, is organised in three sections, taking visitors on a journey from a classical Greek agora to a modern metropolis.



Reflections through Vitrail

French designer Inga Sempé has been inspired by the colours and shapes of Venetian mirrors for the Vitrail collection by Magis Design. A rubber frame available in two colours holds together the pieces that make up the four formats of the collection. Refined and original mirrors, ideal for decorating any room.







Steinway Tower, the world's most 'slender' skyscraper

The American studio SHoP Architects has completed the Steinway Tower in New York, the most 'slender' skyscraper in the world, with a height-to-width ratio of 24:1. The studio was inspired for the project by the golden age of Manhattan's skyscrapers and the Art Deco history of the city. Located at 111 West 57th Street, at 435 metres high it is one of the tallest buildings in the western hemisphere. It has 84 floors and 60 apartments, including a triplex penthouse with exceptional 360° views over Manhattan.

The Guggenheim Museum in Bilbao, in close collaboration with the Norman Foster Foundation, presents the exhibition "Motion. Autos. Art. Architecture". The exhibition includes a selection of 38 legendary vehicles rarely seen by the public. In addition, there are another 300 pieces (including

paintings and sculptures, photographs and audiovisuals, sketchbooks and models) by famous artists and some of the most influential architects and designers of the last century, who also brought their creativity to the automotive world.

The Golden Lion with female flair

Chilean artist Cecilia Vicuña and German sculptor Katharina Fritsch have been awarded the Golden Lion for Lifetime Achievement at the 59th Venice Biennale, which this year has the title "The Milk of Dreams" and is being held until November 27. The award recognises the creative progression of both artists, as well as their commitment and contribution to the canon of art history.

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profile DILLER SCOFIDIO + RENFRO (DS+R)

Inspirational architecture

Recognised with the 2022 Honorary Award for International Architecture by the PORCELANOSA Group, this North American studio is a global benchmark. Its project portfolio includes the transformation of the Lincoln Center campus in New York and The Broad museum of contemporary art in Los Angeles, as well as the renovation of the Museum of Modern Art (MoMA).




Based in New York and comprising more than a hundred architects, designers, artists and researchers, DS+R is led by Elizabeth Diller, Ricardo Scofidio, Charles Renfro and Benjamin Gilmartin. Founded in 1981 by the couple Diller and Scofidio, the studio initially approached projects with a notably utopian spirit that went beyond the architectural narrative to build other stories. Always far from conventional, with Charles Renfro joining the studio in 1997 and a partner from 2004, the studio surprised the world with the Blur building designed for Expo 2002 in Switzerland. The result was a metallic structure on Lake Neuchâtel, which attracted international attention for its evocative character, where the water from the lake was sucked in and sprayed at high pressure, forming an enveloping cloud. "Our studio started as an artistic practice. We financed ourselves and we made ourselves. We worked on all kinds of projects that involved the public and that were not traditional architecture", explains Charles Renfro on his visit to Madrid to collect the award on behalf of the studio.

Since its inception, the DS+R studio has opened up the creative language to make each project a fusion of enriching experiences. Their field of activity encompasses architecture, but also urban design, artistic installations, digital media and printing.

Focused on cultural and civic projects, their work fuses the changing role of institutions and the future of cities. Proof of this is their transformative work in New York over the last decade, with projects such as the High Line in Manhattan. An old elevated railway line over 2 km long has been converted into a linear public park, endowed with green areas, and, above all, a point of reference for locals and visitors. Its presence provides a second level of life to the 1 HYPAR PAVILION AT THE LINCOLN CENTER FOR THE PERFORMING ARTS Formed by a curved plane covered with grass, it houses a restaurant and a green area with easy pedestrian access. 2 THE BROAD MUSEUM The contemporary art collection of the Broad Art Foundation in Los Angeles, immersed in a dialogue between the light and the structural.





3 THE SHED. An extendable 120-metre telescopic frame characterises this arts centre, designed to adapt to the varying media and needs of the artists. 4 MoMA. The project to expand the New York museum has enhanced the current spaces, making them more open and technologically sophisticated. 5 HIGH LINE. Converted into a New York icon, this former elevated railway line is today a linear park of more than 2 kilometres in length that runs through Manhattan. 6 CONTEMPORARY INSTITUTE OF ART. The building provides a flexible and dynamic space next to the Boston waterfront, which acts as an additional attraction for the museum. 7 VAGELOS EDUCATION CENTER. Located in New York, this 14-storey glass tower, with a concrete and steel structure, houses a number of social and educational spaces distributed along a vertical, exposed and interconnected staircase.





city and emphasises the social and sustainable dynamics of New York. Along with the redesign of Alice Tully Hall and the extension of the Juilliard Academy, the studio has been entrusted with the recent renovation of the Museum of Modern Art (MoMA), in a commitment to larger and more transparent interior spaces that aim to accommodate more forms of expression and break down the boundaries between art and the public. In the same line of urban transformation, the futuristic performing arts centre The Shed is a clear manifestation of architectural versatility at the service of art. "Each project is worthy of a great design, be it tiny or an entire city. Everything has to be carefully considered, because every thought makes a difference to people's lives. And design, after all, is to do with people's lives", says Charles Renfro.

Among the studio's new projects is the reactivation and renovation of the AZCA area in Madrid, an activity that it will carry out in collaboration with the studio b720 Fermín Vázquez Arguitectos and the British landscape architects Gustafson Porter + Bowman. The proposal aims to transform this urban space integrated into the city to host cultural and leisure activities, with a large green meadow that incorporates native plant species, recovering old river beds that mix rainwater collection and storage systems for irrigation and fountains. "In the last 25 years we have undertaken some of the most important projects in the world. And we are delighted to be here in Madrid working on one of our next projects, this renovation of AZCA", says the architect, who also recognises the satisfaction of receiving an award like this, "The **PORCELANOSA Group** is one of the most well-known names in the world of design. We have used their products in some of our projects, but more importantly the company is an industry champion of good design. And this award represents the pinnacle. We are truly delighted to have been honoured with it."

13TH PORCELANOSA AWARDS 2022

Talent and sustainable architecture came together at the Four Seasons Hotel in Madrid as the central themes of the 13th Porcelanosa Awards.

The Spanish multinational held its annual awards ceremony to recognise the dedicated work of all those professionals from the world of architecture, design, hotel management and real estate development who have championed sustainability and innovation in their projects.

The gala, presented by the journalist Susanna Griso and Michi Primo de Rivera, showcased the winning submissions and their social function within the new style of urban planning being implemented in large and medium-sized cities.

This architectural redesign that pursues new ways of building and inhabiting spaces was reflected in the speeches and submissions made by each of the winners. This was true for the project PR-132 by María Ying Fernández Arjona, who was presented with the Future Design Award in the Student category for her multifunctional and luminous approach to the design of the presidential suite of a hotel. Connecting the life of a hotel with the natural environment was also the key concept behind The Sea, a presidential suite designed by Ángela Acevedo del Álamo (3A interiorismo) based on the principles of well-being, serenity and balance, which won the Future Design Award in the Professional category for an organic design using the Porcelanosa collections.

Sustainable design in the residential and hotel sector was another main focus of the 13th Porcelanosa Awards. Among the projects that achieved statuettes of honour were the Odiseo leisure complex in Murcia (Design of the Year Award and Special Award 2022), the Only YOU Hotel in Valencia (Award for the Best Interior Design Project) and the Hotel Ibiza Corso (Award for Best Hotel Project).

Notable in the office and corporate area were the Acciona Campus in Madrid (Award for the Best Sustainable Project) and the Colonial Méndez Álvaro Campus (Award for the Best Complex of Corporate Offices, Flexible Offices, Residential and Retail). two projects that applied the principles of energy efficiency and dynamism in their main structures.

Among the people honoured during the night were Susana García-Cereceda (Professional Career Award for the LaFinca Residential Complex) and the North American architectural studio Diller Scofidio + Renfro, whose International Architecture Award was collected by partner Charles Renfro, on behalf of the team.



ODISEO Culinary and leisure centre

Located on one of the main access roads to Murcia city centre, the Odiseo leisure centre becomes a "totem" of air and vegetation thanks to its bioclimatic design in motion. Starting from the primary use of the building (a leisure centre), the project pursues the user experience: from the purely sensory (comfort, the sound of water, reflections, textures) to the psychological (curiosity, amazement, expectation, surprise, smiles...).

Based on these ideas, the building's exterior is composed of a plinth with two staggered levels, which generates a large roof terrace with a pavilion which houses a restaurant. Above is the "totem" (a large latticework of metal tubes that support the sign that crowns the complex) and an elevated terrace crossed by a cantilevered pool 42 metres long and 30 metres high on both sides which, as it rests solely on two central concrete cores, generates projections of up to 22 metres in length.

THE SEA

Diving into the sea has never been so welcoming and comfortable. The Sea is a hotel suite that revolves around the sea, since both the living room and the bedrooms have direct access to the terrace, with two relaxation areas and a large infinity pool that plunges us into the sea.

It is the sea's waves that have been the inspiration for the dominant concept: disconnection while contemplating the sea. An idea that permeates the entire project, starting with the distribution of its 500 m² rectangular floor area. The suite consists of an entrance hall, a living-dining room and an open kitchen, with direct communication between all the spaces. The two bedrooms, with beds centrally placed in the rooms, each have their own bathroom, dressing room and terrace. The mixture of colours and textures has been selected following a fundamental premise: that the light and neutral tones should have a common thread, also adding the richness of the materials by **Porcelanosa**. That atmosphere presides over the whole suite, as shown by the design of the walls of the living room, ripples that, on the ceiling, become authentic waves. This design, which is repeated on the dining table and on the fireplace in the living room, is supported by lighting that also has a decorative role, creating an effect of light and shadow that envelops the entire space.











It's a complex schedule for a highly sought-after actor who is still busy with film projects that require him to move between continents. He has also received offers to star in Broadway musicals, which he has declined, since his attention is focused on his theatre for the moment. Antonio Banderas can do it all; passion and dedication are his hallmarks, as well as careful staging and the artistic quality of all the members of the company. Banderas has recently stated that the company is not for profit and, if there are profits, they will be reinvested in new projects. It is his emphatic way of explaining that he is driven exclusively by artistic passion and the pursuit of excellence.





Close to the municipality of Bétera, this detached family home is located in an exclusive and quiet urbanisation next to a golf course. Designed by the Binomio Arquitectura studio, it is a single storey, made up of three main white volumes which are connected to each other and colonise the entire plot. These, in turn, open through large windows from floor to ceiling, which favours the entry of natural light and offers attractive panoramic views of the surroundings. Each of the volumes is organised in such a way that the most public spaces and access routes remain on the outside, and the elements for private use are located on the inside. As complementary elements, smaller "boxes" appear, connecting the main volumes with each other, configuring the service spaces and generating intermediate and open areas in the form of terraces covered in vegetation, providing a greater sense of perspective and an extra sense of well-being in order to generate life outside as well.

The house is organised around the central volume and its annexes, following an open, light and airy distribution. The day zone and more public area has a large living room, dining room and kitchen, which, in turn, connects to the

pool area. The private area, meanwhile, includes the bedrooms, a study and a gym, all in a harmonious setting that exudes avant-garde and warmth in equal parts. In each of the two environments there is a significant presence of products from **PORCELANOSA Group** companies. In addition, adjacent to the main area, other volumes are annexed that house the guest house, the access and the garage. This union, through a black longitudinal element, gains prominence by acting as a porch linked to the pool and the entire outdoor area.

The elements that make up the house are differentiated by the materials used. While the large volumes are lighter in aesthetic and are built using an external thermal insulation system (SATE) in white and iroko wood, the smaller volumes are "heavier", with a contrasting skin made up of stone and porcelain masonry in dark tones.











interview PATRICK JOUIN

"Everything must change for nothing to change"



Patrick Jouin and Sanjit Manku are much more than a successful partnership of designer and architect. They pursue experimental approaches in all their projects, where interior design and architecture fearlessly embrace industrial production and craftsmanship.

Their studio employs more than 40 people and the projects which have emerged from it display new standards of creativity, such as Montparnasse Station in Paris, the Air France VIP lounge at Paris - Charles de Gaulle international airport, the BIOME, the iconic Van Cleef boutique in Paris, the Mayfair Park Spa, the Espace JCDecaux, their collaborations with the restaurants of chef Alain Ducasse and, of course, the legendary La Mamounia hotel in Marrakesh. Patrick Jouin talks exclusively to *Lifestyle*.

You have said that you like to base your work on experimentation and intuition rather than repetition. In a global and hyperactive world, is it possible to avoid repeating the same formulas? How can you do that? And also, what does it mean for you to seek experimental approaches and how far can we and should we go with interior design and architecture in a world of such great speed and voracity?

Our approach is contextual. Each space, each client and each brand generates a specific environment and demand.

In each project, we establish a response that will not be repeated in other projects, and this is the interesting thing about being two heads in the studio, because we

can always establish a fruitful dialogue with the client and with the context.

Each of us makes his contribution, reacts with a response that allows him to escape from the other's obsession. And the combination of two obsessions finally forms a single answer. As the project progresses, a twist will appear, a detail; the Jouin Manku style. But we're not trying to be recognisable. We want to surprise ourselves and not repeat ourselves, because if we did we would get bored.

In other words, although there are things in our work that are identifiable as "this is them!", everything we do is always unique, because it has an emotional, intuitive part, but also an analytical, contextual part. By combining both, we avoid repetition.

Your projects have received numerous awards and distinctions. What is your conception of luxury and how do you manage to redefine it for these new projects?

In fact, a luxury for me is to live a new experience, and I must clarify that I don't necessarily mean a pleasant experience. Seeing a painting by Georg Baselitz at the Centre Pompidou is very powerful, very violent, but for me it is a luxury, an opportunity to be in front of this work of art. When I first came across this painting, I was astonished. I lived a unique experience.

you to search for a new experience, be it a perfume, a wine, seeing, touching, trying something. In luxury, there is also a dimension in which time stands still. As Alphonse de Lamartine would say, "Oh, time, stop flying!" A perfect harmony is created

For me, this would be the principle of luxury. I believe that luxury allows

"In the history of design there are always aesthetic ruptures, and they are always due to new technologies, new materials, which offer new possibilities" flying!" A perfect harmony is created between body and mind.

How important is it for your studio to investigate new materials and manufacturing techniques? We do not try to use new materials

just because they are new. On the other hand, I think that with each new technique comes a new aesthetic.

For example, take Marc Held, who discovered the curved tube and made his famous chair for Bauhaus. Or Charles

and Ray Eames, who discovered plywood during the war, when they were making splints for wounded soldiers, and from there they invented their famous moulded plywood chair.

In the history of design there are always aesthetic ruptures, and they are always due to new technologies, new materials, which offer new possibilities. That is, we escape from an order by inventing a new one. radiass, wood, metal, learner, wool, cotton, etc. are materials that have been used forever. They are infinite landscapes to redraw, to reinvent. It is clear that technology is here to help us. It is the mix between tradition and invention. We carry out artistic work which is, at the same time, technical work, because what we do must function. If I make a chair, I have to sit on it. If I make a door, it has to open. Inevitably, we must be technical.

What have you learned from the experience of working with culinary creative geniuses such as Alain Ducasse, Pierre Hermé or Jean-Georges? Let's not forget Pierre Gagnaire, Marc Haeberlin, Christian le Squer... the list is long. Each of these creators comes with their universe and their particular taste. For us, obviously, it's easier to work with ultracreative people, because they bring us their own obsession, their own quest for perfection. And this forces us to do better. Alain Ducasse is the person with whom we work the most, and in our projects we can't avoid his perfectionism, which helps us to progress.


One of your award-winning projects is La Mamounia. What were the challenges and achievements?

La Mamounia is not only an icon of Morocco, it is an icon of the world of travel and the imagination of





come together in this private residence.





luxury. It has been chosen several times as the most beautiful hotel in the world. Of course this project was a challenge.

"This hotel is amazing, don't spoil it, but make it even better." It is not a simple proposition when we have something magnificent in front of us. There is also the weight of the memories of thousands of people who came and left their mark, or experienced a magical moment during their stay. When these people return to the hotel they will want to rediscover this memory, and I cannot, I must not damage it. This is the most important thing. And it is invisible, intangible.

The quote in the film *The Leopard*, by Visconti, "everything must change so that nothing changes", expresses the work of our studio very well. We can change everything, but the most important thing is that La Mamounia has an ambience, an atmosphere, which in this case needed a reinterpretation, a respectful evolution. In addition, to cap it all, the project happened at a time that touched us all: COVID-19, a unique moment in human history. This pandemic has been an additional challenge, but we are very pleased because we managed to finish the project within the established timescale.

The general director of La Mamounia, Pierre Jochem, said that he prefers to speak of innovation rather than renovation. Do you agree?

Yes, of course we renovate buildings, but if it was just a renovation, they probably wouldn't call us... For example, to cite some of our projects, the Maison du Peuple, Montparnasse Station or Fontevraud Abbey are places that we are reinventing, innovating. They are all living places, witnesses of their time, and, at the same time, witnesses of the past.

It took three months and three hundred craftsmen to redesign the various zones of La Mamounia. How did you work with this iconic building to preserve all the essence, beauty and charm of its original architecture?


Looking back over the century-long history of this beautiful Art Deco hotel, this is not its first renovation. It was completely reinvented a dozen years ago. In particular by Jacques García, and by André Paccard. Jacques García transformed La Mamounia by giving it an Arabic character. Certain volumes of Art Deco architecture are still present, but only the layout, the distribution, remain. The ornamentation, spirit and style are Moorish Arabic style.


We at Jouin Manku have added a more contemporary and fresh dimension, because we believe that in this way La Mamounia will continue to evolve while its beauty endures. façades



Sustainability as the essence

When dressing their façades, a growing number of international architects trust in the possibilities offered by products from the **PORCELANOSA** Group. In addition to elegance and individuality, these solutions promote energy efficiency and respect for the environment from a perspective which is both innovative and creative.







HILLEL AT THE GEORGE WASHINGTON UNIVERSITY Washington D.C. (USA)

Founded in the 1930s, Hillel at The George Washington University is an organisation that supports the Jewish student community on this university campus. Its new headquarters is a building covered with 670 m² of **STON-KER®** ceramic panels in **Bottega Acero**, which has a grey concrete look that gives the building an elegant and neutral air. The new design, created by the Powers Brown Architecture studio, presents a more modern aesthetic than the previous structure and is based on a ventilated façade system with hidden staples. It has 1,950 m² of facilities distributed over five floors. Large glass panels provide extra lightness, while allowing natural light to enter and connecting the interior spaces with the street.



The ventilated façade is covered with Bottega Acero ceramic tiles by STON-KER[®], which were cut to fit the dimensions of the structure. The horizontal installation joints have different widths to highlight the line of the slabs. This project has been supported by the Technical Façade Department of PORCELANOSA USA. In addition to designing the different modular elements that make up the façade, they also advised during its assembly. *Photos:* Imagen Subliminal.

UNIVERSITY OF TOULOUSE III -PAUL SABATIER

Toulouse (France)

Formed by undulating and dynamic surfaces that simulate the waves of the sea, the façade of the Atomic and Molecular Systems Research Institute (IRSAMC) at the University of Toulouse III - Paul Sabatier has updated its image with the compact mineral Krion[®] K·Life 1100. This was the material chosen by the architects Nicolas Ragueneau and Antoine Roux, from the Ragueneau & Roux Architectes Associés studio, to create a sensation of lightness and movement, in contrast to the uniform tones of the environment. To achieve this undulating effect, a support structure (finished in white) was developed which allowed each piece to be precisely placed. In addition, the physical and technical properties offered by this material, such as insulation, weather resistance, its almost imperceptible joints and its sustainability credentials, give the building an artistic and unique touch.









Wide undulating bands of organic lines in Krion® K-Life 1100 bring dynamism to one of the façades of the IRSAMC headquarters at the University of Toulouse III -Paul Sabatier. Together with its sustainable and hygienic character, the white of the façade provides greater light and improved energy performance for the whole building.

PW WHITEHOUSE

Vancouver (Canada)


The use of white on the façade of this building, located opposite Sunset Beach, reflects nautical associations and the influence of the thick mist that regularly covers the Vancouver skyline. The objective of the project, the work of Buttjes Architecture, was to create an elegant reflective surface, capable of attracting daylight and making the building invisible. Today, the new complex mysteriously fades into the pale blue sky, a strategy of discretion bordering on imperceptibility. The ventilated façade is clad in **Moon White Polished** ceramic tiles by **XTONE**. It follows a staggered joint pattern to enhance the slender proportions of the building. In contrast with the immaculate exterior appearance, the foyer is tinged with darkness using the finishes **Polished** and **Nature** from the collection **Liem Dark**, also by **XTONE**.















For this project, designed by the Buttjes Architecture studio, a strong formal contrast has been introduced between the crisp white of the exterior, based on the collection Moon White Polished by XTONE, and the all-enveloping black of the lobby interior. A single continuous surface, based on Liem Dark by XTONE, in finishes Polished and Nature, covers walls, ceiling and floor, creating an evocative and enigmatic space that is accompanied by Pro-light lighting profiles by Butech.

Integrating into the environment

Winner of the PORCELANOSA INTERNATIONAL PROJECT AWARD in the residential category, this family home in Bétera, designed by Alejandro Tejedor + Asociados, features materials from the PORCELANOSA Group collections.

The house flows into the spectacular garden, dominated by the swimming pool and a relaxation area. The terraces are paved in non-slip natural stone by L'Antic Colonial. The large-format pieces have been secured using Super-Flex S2 high-performance adhesive by Butech. The interior of the pool has been finished in Arizona Caliza ceramic tiles by Porcelanosa.



The resplendent natural light of the Mediterranean has been treated as a space in its own right, and the structures and materials of the home have been integrated into it. This is what the architect Alejandro Tejedor has achieved in this building which, above all, displays and emphasises the prominence of materials such as concrete and cement. The project is designed so that everyone who lives in the house can enjoy wide and open spaces, without obstacles that could interrupt the view of the outside through the large windows.

This fusion of interior and exterior can be seen especially in the main rooms, where **Aged Clay Nature** large-format flooring by **XTONE** predominates. 

Sophistication without limits for this family home

The Canadian studio Jackson McCormick Design Group has designed this home with a classic essence and contemporary edge where the use of **XTONE** large-format ceramic stoneware on walls and floors has created spectacular interiors with striking character. The façade of the house combines full-length glass windows with ceramic panels anchored using the ventilated façade system C-Bolt by Butech and large-format pieces from the series Nuba White Polished by XTONE. The large-format flooring that reproduces the shine of marble is also used to dress the fireplace in this living area.



A perfect combination of textures and reflections characterises this residential project carried out by the Canadian architecture and design studio Jackson McCormick Design Group and Paul Lavoie Interior Design in this family home in the Canadian state of Alberta. A partnership specialising in the design of luxury homes, here they have established a unique balance between practicality and high-quality design to make the most of every space. One of the first challenges of the project was to adapt the design to the terrain, which has a slight slope, and to develop environmentally friendly solutions that promote energy efficiency and the use of sustainable materials. The result is this spectacular, refined home where careful attention to every detail has been made possible by the painstaking work of Barham Contracting and Halo Marble & Tile.

From the outside, the marble blocks follow one another as a prelude to a glass structure that delimits the body of the house, giving it solemnity and lightness. To preserve privacy and filter the entry of natural light through the full-length glass windows, large light curtains in neutral tones have been used, bringing a more theatrical effect






distributed around two work islands, one of which has an integrated office. The island base units and the fronts in black contrast with the white panelled fronts and appliances arranged along the perimeter of the walls. This creates a harmonious two-colour play with the marble-effect floor in Nuba White by XTONE. Below: the play between the marbled flooring and the furniture enhances the luminositv. On the right: to provide a greater effect of continuity between the levels of the house, the Jackson McCormick Design Group studio has arranged a sequence of large blocks of Nuba White Polished ceramic wall covering by XTONE as a wide sculptural band that goes from the floor of the lower level to the roof of the house.

to the whole. As you enter the house, the floor design, in an extravagant Arabescato marble, captivates the eye with its distinctive grey veining that contrasts with the bright white background.

The ground floor has the most public and social rooms, such as the kitchen, the dining room and the living room, with the upper level reserved for the main bedrooms. The **XTONE** ceramic stoneware used on the floor also covers the walls, a solution that blurs the spatial limits and emphasises the spectacular nature of the different environments. In turn, the use of glossy black lacquered furniture in the kitchen, dining room and dressing room contrasts with the veined white of the walls and enhances it even more, if possible.

The chrome finishes on profiles and handles give an extra touch of sophistication, with a play of reflections in an elegant combination of black and white, all accompanied by warm and welcoming ambient lighting, with unique effects that give an extra touch of personality to the whole project. In contrast to the black and white dichotomy, touches of colour in shades of blue and burgundy make appearances in textiles, coverings and decorative objects.







The more intimate character of the master bedroom is reflected in a monochromatic space where neutral tones such as white and grey prevail. Details in a metallic finish and the use of mirrors create an attractive play of shine and sparkle, matching the floor in Nuba White Polished by XTONE in combination with the decorative wall coverings by Porcelanosa. The same flooring is used in the dressing room and bathroom, in a constant combination of pieces in black gloss, mirror or chrome finishes. The shower area is equipped with a built-in bench, covered with the same XTONE ceramic stoneware which extends along the wall, in combination with metal-effect tiling and tiles in the form of marineeffect tesserae in an elegant balance of contrasts.









In the bedrooms, the immaculate image prevails with prominently white furniture, with metallic details and mirrored finishes that add depth and theatricality. The large suspended glass light fittings harmonise with an atmosphere that invites you to dream. The master bathroom, with its sculptural circular bathtub, follows the same decorative line. It has a symmetrical layout with two washbasin areas where reflections are created thanks to the presence of mirrored furniture. These redefine the classic concept in favour of a contemporary aesthetic that enhances natural light, filling the whole space with vitality. Likewise, the use of black tempered glass on the stairs, work surfaces and enclosures completes a combination of materials and textures that give continuity to the different levels.



BULARAS HOME POZUELO DE ALARCON (MADRID)

A dialogue between beauty and functionality

Natural light floods into the rooms of this detached family home, designed and built by estudio3 Arquitectos, and brings an atmosphere of serenity. This visual purity highlights the volumes and spaces that are formed, while at the same time giving identity and character to the whole.

The cubic forms of the house provide semi-covered outdoor spaces that invite you to enjoy the surrounding from this domesticated natural environment. The flooring throughout this zone together with some of the wall finishes, are from the collection Bottega Caliza by Porcelanosa. The entire ement giving access to the house is finished with the same ceramic feel, in warm tones with an industrial aesthetic, as is the outside porch area and it even gives continuity to the flooring inside the pool. This paving has a non-slip finish to ensure maximum safety.



Based on an attractive contemporary, open and airy design, this family home stands on a plot of 2,500 m², on a slight incline that starts at the road and goes uphill until it reaches the house. The project, led by Santiago Martínez, design architect at estudio3 Arguitectos, seeks to provide functionality and flexibility, while at the same time achieving maximum energy efficiency. To this end, a ventilated facade has been designed with the insulation on the outside to avoid thermal bridges and achieve a 60% improvement in the thermal transmittance of the carpentry. In addition, the air conditioning has been implemented using a geothermal heat pump and underfloor heating and cooling that offers greater optimisation of resources. The entire house is oriented to the south, which makes it a pleasant and comfortable house to live in. Three main materials have been used: natural stone, wood and glass.

The 870 m² home has been designed over two floors. The ground floor is designed to be a daytime area and this is where the most public and social rooms are located: the living room, the dining room and the kitchen, together with a guest bedroom and a bathroom. Fluid communication is established thanks to the large openings and the natural light that bathes the interior. A dominant palette of warm colours, present in both materials and furniture, favours this dialogue between the different interior environments. Likewise, thanks to the full-length sliding windows, and the use of the same style of flooring inside and outside the house, the visual limits between exterior and interior are blurred and physical communication is also encouraged once the windows are opened. Next to the kitchen and the living room, porches and terraces have been created that invite you to enjoy the fresh air and the







The physical and visual communication that is established between the interior and the exterior of the house is emphasised by the use of the same collection by Porcelanosa, thanks to the availability of a wide variety of finishes, modularity and adaptability. The light tone brings extra luminosity and warmth to a space that is dressed with furniture where noble raw materials prevail, such as stone and wood in the kitchen, dining room and living room. The stairs that lead to the first floor have a glass railing, to emphasise the spatial lightness and the visual relationship. The backlit cantilevered steps in a wood finish complement the Nobu Roble flooring by Porcelanosa which is used throughout the upper level. The kitchen has furniture by Gamadecor and the taps are Spring by Noken.






surroundings. You can also relax here after a swim in the adjoining pool.

A staircase located opposite the entrance door to the house leads to the first floor, conceived as a private/ night-time area. The vertical windows next to the wooden steps allow light to filter into the interior, establishing a play of intensities that varies with the movement of the sun, in a dynamic oscillation that evolves throughout the day. On the upper level, the space is divided into four bedrooms and four bathrooms, one for each bedroom, each with a different aesthetic, but all equipped with products by the **PORCELANOSA Group**. Pure forms, maximum luminosity, and attractive and functional equipment dress the different rooms and give them a welcoming appearance.





In the main bathroom, the ceramic wood PAR-KER[®] Nobu Roble by Porcelanosa has been combined with the wall finish Capri Stone by Porcelanosa. For the shower and toilet area, separated by glass enclosures, the decorative finish used is Capri Lineal Stone by Porcelanosa. The free-standing bathtub is the model Lounge Oval and the taps are Round, also by Noken, in a black finish. In the shower, the shower head is the model Neptune Slim Rondo and the tap is Round, all in the same black finish. In the washbasin area, the builtin tap is Round by Noken, which contrasts with the wall finished in Capri Stone by Porcelanosa. Meanwhile, the bathroom is equipped with flooring in Bottega Caliza by Porcelanosa, wall-hung toilet NK Concept, flush button Double Smart Line NK Concept and mixer tap Round, all by Noken.



Interior designer Evi Om's studio has completed this attractive apartment located in the heart of Amsterdam. Designed in a contemporary style with classic touches, the details emphasise furniture that is rich in nuances, colours and materials. In order to provide the space with more natural light and air, a range of lighting scenarios have been created. Each room has a specific colour scheme that unifies surfaces. For example, in the kitchen and dining room, green and aquamarine tones are combined with custommade cabinets and, in the kitchen, with a large-format piece in Calacatta Green by XTONE.

P PA PORCELANOSA INTERNATIONAL PROJECT AWARD 2022







The BAM park in Milan was the main stage for the Porcelanosa International Project Award presentation ceremony, where innovation, architecture and talent became the real stars. The prizes were awarded to the most outstanding

projects in the four categories of the contest: residential, commercial, hotel sector and public spaces.

Between the four categories, a total of 123 projects of various characteristics and dimensions were submitted from 32 countries. Five finalists were selected for each section, based on the fundamental premise of this first year of the award: that the designs should be inspired by and integrated into the environment.


The finalists in each section defended their projects before an international jury at the flagship PORCELANOSA store in Milan, located at number 19 in the iconic Piazza Castello, opposite Sforzesco Castle.

The jury was made up of a group of notable architects who are experts in the field: architect Leonardo Cavalli (co-founder of One Works and member of the Italian Institute of Architects), Michel Rojkind (co-founder of the innovative Mexican studio Rojkind Arquitectos), Greg Truen (co-founder of the South African architecture firm Saota) and Anabel Fernández Rubio (senior member of the renowned and historic North American architecture firm Kohn Pedersen Fox Associates, KPF).

In this first year of the award, the winning projects were Casa Oriol by the architect Alejandro Tejedor (Valencia, Spain) in the residential category, Al Hira Beach by the 3deluxe studio (Sharjah City, UAE) in the commercial category, Grand Fiesta Americana Hotel by the architecture studio Tres Más Dos (Oaxaca, Mexico) in the hotel category and AI Qana by MZ Architects (Abu Dhabi, UAE) in the category of public spaces.

They are all excellent examples of design integrated into the environment, perfectly in keeping with the main theme of these awards.

Odile Decq: "Each project is not only an experiment, but also an adventure"

The French architect and urban planner Odile Decq is characterised by her unique style, based on constant dynamism. From her own studio based in Paris, Decq expands her creativity around the world with projects such as the Antares Tower in Barcelona, a 28-storey skyscraper with 88 homes, located in front of the sea. The fixtures and fittings of the apartments exude luxury and to ensure this there has been active involvement from the PORCELANOSA Group.






"With Antares I have sought a design that breathes dynamism in every place and every moment. A dynamism that emanates from the city itself and that has always fascinated me. This gives the building a strong identity and an enriching perception of time and space that shows a holistic approach to design from the outside in, conveying the idea that each part of the building is a whole, with its components in relation and constant interactions between them and the entire building. We have tried to play with the curves -something that reminds us of Antoni Gaudí, the architectural genius of Barcelona- and with the colours -red, black and white, in reference to Joan Miró- to give the building its own personality and turn it into something unique and unrepeatable", she explains.

Winner of the Venice Architecture Biennale in 1996, she has taught several generations of new architects from different international schools and universities, including the renowned École Spéciale d'Architecture (ESA) in Paris, which Odile Decg herself directed between 2007 and 2012. "To the new generations I suggest that they do not hesitate to take risks. There is nothing wrong with taking risks. They may fail, but that's OK, you just have to keep going and have a little patience. The road is long", says the French architect. Faced with the challenges of the future, Odile Decq prefers not to make predictions, since "the future is unpredictable and changes overnight." However, she is clear that beyond new technologies and new design paradigms in favour of sustainability, "the objective of architecture itself is to provide spaces for human beings." As she defines it, "man is the true subject of architecture and this must allow individuals to improve their quality of life. Architecture is a public service." And in the same vein, Odile Decq has designed the imposing Antares Tower, which has just been named the best new residential building in Spain by the prestigious International Property Awards.


A new concept in workspaces




projects TOUSIDONIS ANISI in Seville

Vertical life

In the heart of Triana, one of the most iconic neighbourhoods in Seville, lies Casa de la Cruz. The house was designed by the TOUSIDONIS ANISI studio, whose partners, Fernando Mena and Konstantino Tousidonis, have just been included in the list Best Emerging Young Architects / Europe 40 under 40. The idea was to respect the environment of two-storey family homes, but to provide more contemporary solutions. On a plot with a frontage of 5 metres and a depth of 20 metres, the house is distributed over three levels connected by a linear staircase. The entrance is on the ground floor, which is used as a work area and a gym open to a small patio. The living accommodation is found on the upper two floors, with bedrooms and bathrooms on the first floor and day rooms (living room, dining room and kitchen) on the second. This connects in a double-height space with the roof where there is a swimming pool and relaxation area.
